Spanish focus:

Spain is well known for its seafoof dishes such as paella and this is due to the rich waters around the coast. It is also known for it's rice and bean dishes. Paella is Spains national dish and is eaten in countires around the globe. Sangria is also one of the most well known drinks in Spain and this is a type of red wine with fruits in.

Cooking:

Explorers will need be split into three groups and each will work on either the starter, main or dessert. The members of each group are responsible for their dish. You will need basic cooking equiptment and access to either an oven or camping cooking stove.

Starter - Ensaladilla Rusa



Ingredients

2 tbsp oil

3 tbsp tomato purée

1 tsp smoked paprika

800g potato, cut into small chunks

4 garlic cloves

<u>juice 1/2 lemon</u>

handful flat-leaf parsley leaves, roughly chopped

Method

STEP 1

Heat oven to 180C/fan 160C/gas 4. Mix the oil, tomato purée and paprika together, then coat the potatoes thoroughly in it. Squash the garlic in its skin with the flat of a knife and place on a baking tray with the potatoes.

STEP 2

Season well with salt and pepper, then roast for 40 mins, turning halfway through, until the potatoes have crisped up and are fluffy inside. Five mins before the end of cooking, sprinkle over the lemon juice and return to the oven. Serve with the parsley scattered over.

Why not try frying instead of roasting?

Main - Spanish Beans



Ingredients

350g lean pork mince

2 tsp olive oil

1 large red onion, chopped

2 peppers, sliced, any colour will do

3 garlic cloves, crushed

1 tbsp <u>sweet smoked paprika</u>

2 x 400g cans chopped tomatoes

400g can butter beans, drained

2 tsp golden caster sugar

small bunch parsley, chopped

crusty bread, to serve (optional)

Method

STEP 1

Season the pork, working the seasoning in with your hands, then shape into small meatballs. Heat the oil in a large pan, add the meatballs and cook for 5 mins, until golden brown all over. Push to one side of the pan and add the onion and peppers. Cook for a further 5 mins, stirring now and then, until the veg has softened, then stir in the garlic and paprika. Stir everything around in the pan for 1 min, then add the tomatoes. Cover with a lid and simmer for 10 mins.

STEP 2

Uncover, stir in the beans, the sugar and some seasoning, then simmer for a further 10 mins, uncovered. Just before serving, stir in the parsley. Serve with crusty bread for dunking, if you like.

Instead of using meat, why not substitute for other Spanish inspired vegetables such as peppers or asparagus?

Desert - Churros



Ingredients

50g butter, melted

1/2 tsp vanilla extract

250g <u>plain flour</u>, from a new bag (essential for absorbing the liquid)

1 tsp baking powder

about 1 litre sunflower oil

a few chunks of bread

For the sauce

200g <u>dark chocolate</u>, not too bitter, broken into chunks

100ml double cream

100ml whole milk

3 tbsp golden syrup

1/2 tsp vanilla extract, if you have some

For the cinnamon sugar

100g caster sugar

2 tsp cinnamon

Choose which ever toppings you fancy!

Method

STEP 1

Boil the kettle, then measure 300ml boiling water into a jug and add the melted butter and vanilla extract. Sift the flour and baking powder into a big mixing bowl with a big pinch of salt. Make a well in the centre, then pour in the contents of the jug and very quickly beat into the flour with a wooden spoon until lump-free. Rest for 10-15 mins while you make the sauce.

STEP 2

Put all the sauce ingredients into a pan and gently melt together, stirring occasionally until you have a smooth shiny sauce. Keep warm on a low heat.

STEP 3

Fill a large deep saucepan one-third full of oil. Cooking with hot oil can be dangerous – before you start, read up on how to deep-fry safely to avoid accidents in the kitchen. Heat until a cube of bread browns in 45 seconds to 1 min. Cover a tray with kitchen paper and mix the caster sugar and cinnamon together.

STEP 4

Fit a star nozzle to a piping bag - 1.5-2cm wide is a good size. Fill with the rested dough, then pipe 2-3 strips directly into the pan, snipping off each dough strip with a pair of kitchen scissors. Fry until golden brown and crisp. Be very careful here - if air bubbles form in the churros they can explode, especially if the oil overheats or you use old flour. Cooking with hot oil can be dangerous - before you start, read up on how to deep-fry safely to avoid accidents in the kitchen. Keep children out of the kitchen and protect yourself by wearing long sleeves and eye protection, and keeping your face away from the pan.

Australia - Aboriginal Painting:







Your Explorers will use these images as inspiration to create their own aboriginal art.

Using paint of your choice, Explorers will use the cotton buds to dot colour onto their page.

You will need:

- White paper
- Coloured paint of your choice and/or felt tip pens
- Cotton buds
- Pencils

Why not try using felt tip pens instead of paint?

New Zealand - Māori colouring:








Māori art is a spiritual form of art that is typically very intricate. They would usually be painted using natural pigments.


Using felt tips, colour in the sheets on the pages overleaf.

Swedish – Folk art paper crafts:



Your Explorers will use these images as inspiration to create their own Swedish Folk art.

They will cut coloured paper to make animal and floral shapes. They will then layer their cut pieces and glue them down. Add detail using pencil crayon or felt tip.

You will need:

- White paper
- Coloured paper of your choice
- Felt tip pens and/or pencil crayons
- Scissors
- Glue sticks

Fancy a challenge?

Try adding more animals or floral shapes to the piece.



These activities are all based around popular games played around the world. These games could be played in rotation or as a unit depending on how many Explorers you have.

Turkish Draughts (commonly played in Turkey, Egypt and Greece):

Rules of the game:

- 1. Whites move first
- 2. Pieces can only move forwards or sideways one square (pieces cannot move backwards
- 3. To capture the opponents pieces they have to be jumped over either forwards, left or right
- 4. If either side gets a piece to the other side, they become a king (shown by having another piece placed on top)
- 5. A king can move any number of spaces and in any direction including backwards



Dominoes (Originating in China and now played commonly globally):



Rules of the game:

- 1. Dominoes are shuffled and each player is dealt five pieces
- 2. Place a single domino in the middle
- 3. Each player takes a turn in placing a single piece down
- 4. If a player cannot place a piece, they either miss a go or pick up another piece (depending on how many tiles are available)
- 5. The player who gets rid of their pieces first wins

Pick-up Sticks (originating in China):

Rules of the game:

- One player holds the pick-up sticks, straws or match sticks vertically before dropping all of their items
- 2. Players then take it in turns to pick up the sticks one by one without making any other stick move
- 3. If a stick moves the player must put the stick back and the next player goes



Kyykkä (the Finland version of skittles):



Rules of the game:

- 1. A series of wooden blocks (or plastic bottles) are placed in an area in any arrangement
- 2. Players take it in turns to throw a longer length of wood to see how many skittles they can knock over

Peso Toss (a Mexican throwing game):

Rules of the game:

- A number of hats or buckets are place in a line at varying distances – the further the object the more points it is worth
- 2. Players take it in turns to throw a number of 2p coins or counters into the hats or buckets
- 3. The player with the highest score at the end wins



Hot Sombrero (a Mexican version of musical chairs but with a hat):



Rules of the game:

- 1. Players stand or sit in a circle
- 2. Music is played and the hat is passed around
- 3. When the hat gets to each player, they must put the hat on before passing it on
- 4. The player with the hat when the music stops is out


Ein, Zwei, Drei...Halt! (A German version of what's the time Mr Wolf):

Rules of the game:

- 1. Explorers stand next to each other in a line, one person stands at the other end facing away
- 2. The person at the other end counts to three out loud before shouting halt and faces the rest of the group (the others at this point are moving towards the single person)
- 3. When the caller turns the other players have to freeze, anyone not frozen will be sent back to the start area
- 4. The first person to reach the catcher then becomes the catcher



Anka-anka-grå-anka (the original Swedish version of duck, duck goose):



Rules of the game:

- 1. Players sit in a circle and one player stands on the outside
- 2. The player on the outside walks around the circle tapping other players (calling them duck)
- 3. The player walking around will then tap another player by calling them goose
- Both players must run around the circle clockwise – the player at the front tries to sit back in their opponents space before being caught

Lawn Bowls (this game originated in ancient Egypt and became an English favourite in the 13th Century):

Rules of the game:

- 1. One player rolls the jack ball (the target ball)
- 2. Players take it in turns to roll their balls
- 3. The player who gets their ball closest to the jack wins





Chinese Candle Holder:

Steps to make:

- 1. Rip up red tissue paper and apply to the outside of your chosen jar with a thin layer of PVA glue
- 2. Let jar dry
- 3. Using black paint or pen, decorate the jar with Chinese lettering or symbols
- 4. Place a tealight or battery powered light inside the jar

- Paintbrushes
- Black paint or felt tip
- Tealight or battery powered candle


Fan Dragon:

Steps to make:

- 1. Colour in the dragon template

- 3. Make five paper fans, making sure to glues them at one end to keep them together
- 4. Glue all of the paper fans together in a line
- 5. Stick on the head and tail
- 6. Attach two straws using cellotape




Folding Fortune cat:
